About the Alzheimer's Disease Working Group

In March 2014, Governor Jay Inslee signed Senate Bill 6124 to authorize development of an Alzheimer's Disease Plan for Washington state. The bill required the Department of Health and Social Services to convene an Alzheimer's Disease Working Group (ADWG). The job of the ADWG was to examine the needs of diagnosed individuals, services available and provider capacity, and to produce a State Plan to support citizens impacted by Alzheimer's disease and other dementias, and the health care providers who serve them. The Alzheimer's Disease Plan for Washington state was presented to the state legislature in February 2016 in recognition of the ongoing complexities and reach of this disease.
